Should NURSES perform tubal ligation (post-partum and interval)?

Problem: Poor access to contraception Option: Nurses performing tubal ligation Comparison: Care delivered by other cadres or no care

Setting: Community/primary health care settings in LMICs with poor

access to health professionals

	The panel acknowledges the different methods of tubal ligation that may be relevant in this context.		
Justification	There is insufficient evidence on the effectiveness of this intervention. However, this intervention may be a cost-effective, acceptable and feasible approach to contraception and may also reduce inequalities by extending care to underserved populations.
